



## Did you know that Brighton and Hove has an elected, independent Older People's Council?

Established in 2001 with the support of the City Council, the Older People's Council (the "OPC") works to ensure that all older people in the City are treated with respect and have access to services and support to lead fulfilling lives. The OPC monitors issues affecting older people and liaises with City Councillors, the Health Authorities, local MPs and the Government.

Recent OPC campaigns have covered the provision of better public toilet facilities; more public seating in the City; challenging pavement obstructions; the introduction of a garden waste collection scheme; heating and energy costs; and better health, housing and transport services for older people.

## Elections for the OPC are held every 4 years
